# **Curriculum Map (Rubric IV)**

A curriculum map is a visual tool that aligns Program Learning Outcomes (PLOs) with the courses in a degree program. It shows where each outcome is Introduced (I), Reinforced (R), Mastered (M), and Assessed (A), helping faculty ensure intentional design and progression.

## **Why Curriculum Mapping Matters**

Curriculum maps are essential for:

- Demonstrating alignment between courses and learning outcomes
- Supporting accreditation and external review processes
- Identifying gaps or redundancies in instruction
- Ensuring students have a clear path to mastering key skills and knowledge

## **Steps to Create a Curriculum Map**

- 1. List the Program Learning Outcomes (**PLOs**)
- 2. Identify required courses in the major
- 3. Structure courses and events in the order they occur within the student journey.
- 4. Determine where each PLO is Introduced (I), Reinforced (R), and Mastered (M)
- 5. Determine where each PLO is Assessed (A)
- 6. Use a table to visualize the alignment
- 7. Review the map with faculty to ensure accuracy and progression

#### This map shows:

- Not all majors are trained on PLOs 1 and 3.
   PLO 3 only applies to those with an internship.
- Too much time passes between introduction and mastery of PLO 2.
- Two required courses fail to train students on the PLOs.

#### This map shows:

- All majors have the same opportunities to learn all PLOs
- The PLOs are taught throughout the curriculum
- Assessment occurs at or close to mastery

#### Tips for a Meaningful Curriculum Map

Focus on required courses to ensure consistency
Ensure a logical progression from I to R to M
Discuss the role of required courses that do not cover any PLOs
Assess when mastery is expected or as close to it as possible
Avoid overloading courses with too many PLOs
Use the map to guide curriculum updates
